## Letter from the Executive Director 👺

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year! Stafford Animal Shelter is proud of the many repairs and improvements made to our facility in 2023. Although burdened with a tragedy, it is warming to hear the community share their positive perspective on the shelter that YOU supported to save! If you have not yet been in, I encourage you to stop by!



Stafford has most recently completed the repairs on our fences that were

damaged related to the pressure of the swift flood waters. The fencing has been improved to now stand six feet tall to ensure the safety of our canines. In addition, Stafford Animal Shelter is grateful for our supporters and the Glassybaby Foundation for their commitment to our animals' wellbeing to execute the removal of the gravel from our indoor canine kennels and to install drainage and concrete. The concrete will allow proper disinfection and decrease the opportunity for infectious disease to infect our animals. Thank you to the Mildred Y. Manion Charitable Foundation & Argent Trust for their dedication to our animals providing paneling for our dog kennels and new stainless steel ported cat enclosures for Cat Quarantine. According to The Association of Shelter Veterinarian's guidelines double-sided housing is a shelter requirement for cats and canines. The grant increases our on-site canine capacity by six! The previous cat kennels were donated to the City of White Sulphur Springs Animal Control.

Across the nation shelter and rescue organizations are facing a staffing shortage. Unfortunately, Stafford Animal Shelter has been challenged with recruiting and retaining our staff. According to Best Friends's Staffing Shortage Survey Data, "Staffing is down 87% of all organizations that responded." The most cited reason (71%) for staffing shortage for organizations was "Unable to recruit, hire, and maintain staffing levels." Therefore, we have prioritized work-life balance by increasing accrual of paid-time-off, initiated a Simple IRA for our staff and acknowledge that the team is the root of our organization celebrating their growth, development, and strengths. Please take this into consideration as our team is working hard to provide all our clients with the best experience.

I am happy to share our Board of Directors has officially voted Gwen Strachan as President and Darcy Cook as Vice President. Stafford Animal Shelter is grateful for the many years of service and dedication former President, Sue Dailey and former Vice President, Nikki Fox provided our organization! Our team at Stafford Animal Shelter is excited to kick off 2024 and we can only do this with support from YOU!

## Love is Patient

On September 20th Stafford Animal Shelter received eleven hound dogs who needed our help! Beverly, Lwaxana, Data, Deana and her seven puppies. Our animal care team stepped up and right in to rescue these hounds, their only hope was in our hands. Our animal care team is not here to judge, but rather to serve and help all animals in need! It was apparent the dogs were in poor condition and extremely undersocialized.

From their intake examinations, it was decided to house them in our Bon K9 Rescue Center, to ensure the health and safety of our other dogs and puppies. During our intake procedure, animals receive vaccinations and dewormer to prevent communicable disease. Our cover model momma, Deana, remained with her puppies as we began the weaning process. The puppies, as suspected, were infested with internal parasites, and quickly began shedding dead worms. The three adults were moved to our main building, once medically cleared by our veterinarian team and made available for adoption.

Soon after the puppies' condition began to change. The puppies were observed to be lethargic, with a decreased appetite and loose stools. Consequently, they tested positive for Parvovirus, a life-threatening, but preventable virus when provided sufficient vaccination. Deana was ready to rest and Stafford was ready to save her puppy's lives! The treatment for this virus requires around the clock supportive care for all seven puppies. Our animal care team poured their hearts and sweat into this litter. Stafford is happy to share all seven puppies survived and have already found their loving homes.



However, their mother Deana needed some more socialization before finding her family. Luckily she spent her days in a foster home with three other dogs. Deana's foster mom shares her experience as a foster:

"To foster a shy and scared dog like Deana is to watch your love and patience, heal and grow. The bond you build with a shy dog is something you will always cherish. Watching them come out of their shell and feel love is the most rewarding feeling."

All the patience paid off, Deana has been adopted by a very understanding and loving family! She will never be bred again and she will be loved forever.



Stafford Animal Shelter acknowledges there is an overpopulation of animals in our own community and surrounding areas. We are committed to providing resources and assistance to individuals to be able to spay and neuter their animal(s). We are also aware and recognize the difficulties the people of Montana and our local community are facing with access and affordability to find pet-friendly housing and veterinarian care. Our mission is to support our community in maintaining healthy animals and finding alternatives to surrendering their animals. Unfortunately, the other two other adults are still awaiting to find a foster or adopter. Beverly and Lwaxana are both females, around eleven months old and have been in the shelter for over a month. Both ladies are making great

progress, but will require a patient owner, willing to build their trust and love, preferably with a confident dog. Fostering them would grant a much needed break from the shelter environment and an opportunity to work on socialization and trust in the outside world. They are both dog-friendly. 
## Friends For Life

Stafford Animal Shelter's mission expands beyond adoptions to address the increased local need for access to veterinarian care, alternatives to surrender, pet food, pet-friendly/affordable housing and safety net services.

Meet Scout, a handsome German Shorthaired Pointer, who was diagnosed with Addison's Disease that requires: routine lab work, daily medication, and regular costly treatment. Scout's vet shared with his family their two options were to humanely euthanize or surrender their dog since they were unable to afford his treatment. Scout is part of the family, and Stafford was able to help support some of Scout's care through our "Friends For Life" program! People and pets belong TOGETHER.

Meet Fergus, a Stafford Animal Shelter Alumni, who is pictured in his owner Gene's lap, licking his face. Fergus' itchy skin bumps improved on antibiotics, antihistamines, and bathing, but the skin problem rapidly returned when the medications were completed. Bathing helped to reduce Fergus' itchiness, but bathing Fergus every day is not practical for Gene. The veterinarian did not recommend giving Fergus daily antibiotics, antihistamines and possibly corticosteroids due to the side effects on his long term health. Therefore, Stafford was able to assist Gene with providing a safe skin allergy injection to bring comfort and relief to Fergus. Gene had been stressed and worried, watching his best bud scratch and chew himself, constantly. Now they are both experiencing some relief.

Meet Stephen and Buddy. Stafford Animal Shelter cared for his fourteen-year-old Australian shepherd when he was in rehab for COVID-19. After his loved



animal had passed, he looked for a companion to keep him company. Stafford recognizes that everyone deserves to experience the unconditional love an animal provides; therefore, Stafford was able to support Stephen financially by covering his pet deposit at his rental property. Buddy and Stephen are a bonded pair, just as it should be.

## Preparations for your Pet


Eleanor was originally adopted in 2019 from Stafford Animal Shelter. Unfortunately, Eleanor's owner's health declined and she was admitted to Hospice Care. Therefore, Eleanor found herself back at Stafford Animal Shelter looking for her second chance. Although end-of-life planning is difficult and emotional, Stafford Animal Shelter encourages pet owners to have a plan for their beloved pets.

It's unfortunately all too common for people to forget to factor their pets into their end-of-life plans — and even if they do, those plans can often fall apart. If sending your animal to a family member or friend, life changes and caring for an animal could become a burden or plans may fall through.

One option is to explain all wishes in a will. In that case, leaving a pet to a specific person or organization-who would act as their caretaker after their owner has passed. In addition, a certain amount of money can be passed on to the person or organization to cover the costs of food, supplies, and other luxuries the animal might need. A pet trust is a legal agreement which reserves money specifically for the care of a pet, and those funds are managed by someone who is required to spend them per the specifications. When creating a trust, cost should be a factor, as it is not cheap.

If the individual does not have a friend or family member who can commit to caring for their animal, following their death, Stafford Animal Shelter is ready and committed to every pet's happiness and future. Stafford's adoption counselors advise and recommend pairing senior pets with seniors, for this very reason. The client and animal's age should be a factor when adopting an animal.

Whichever route is chosen, it's most important to have a plan that's carefully considered. That way you'll be assured that the furry loved one who's given so much will be cared for after their owner is gone — which is exactly what they deserve.



In October, Cricket had been dropped off at Stafford Animal Shelter, by the Police Department, after her owner passed away. Unfortunately, there was no plans made on Cricket's behalf; therefore, we welcomed her with open arms. Cricket was observed to be scared, confused, and anxious, at the shelter. Therefore, Cricket was quickly placed in a foster home to begin to relax and grieve the loss of her beloved owner. Happily Cricket was adopted and started her next chapter.



#### Eleanor had the same fate:

"When we saw the post about Eleanor and how she needed a new home because her owner was placed in hospice, it touched us, so we went straight to Stafford Animal Shelter to meet her. We immediately fell in love and decided to welcome her to our home. The adoption process was made easy by the friendly, helpful staff, and I felt comfortable that they truly cared about Eleanor's wellbeing. I couldn't imagine how confusing the sudden change in circumstances was for Eleanor. Although she understandably does not want to let us out of her sight, her transition to a new home has been a joy, and she is getting lots of attention and exercise socializing with her new sister, Autumn, as well as other playmates on the local trails. In just a few weeks she has settled in and has stolen our hearts." - Rod & Laurel


